CATCHING DISEASES AND GERMS FROM ANIMALS. ALLERGIES TO PLANTS AND INSECTS	Medium Low	Although the children will have the very valuable experience of feeding a variety of animals the staff will ensure that children regularly and thoroughly wash their hands at the designated hand wash sites, which included soap and paper towels around the farm. Children will also be made aware of the dangers of placing their faces against the animals or putting their hands in their mouths afterwards. Before any contact with animals adults will ensure that children do not have uncovered cuts of grazes. Eating lunch will only take place once all children and adults have washed their hands thoroughly. If the weather is pleasant but not too sunny the children will eat in the picnic area. If it is windy or raining then the children will eat in the education barn both of which animals do not have access to. No food will be eaten whilst touring the farm NB — it is vital you ensure that any female helpers are not pregnant or even think they may be. If they are, they should not go close to any animals on the visit Supervisors and children should not touch or rub plants unnecessarily and should not agitate stinging insects. Poisonous / stinging plants removed when found by farm staff.

Explain to the children they must not make any sounds or movement which may frighten the animals e.g. shouting, clapping, banging bars etc. Do not allow children into areas where animals are loose unless the animals are supervised and controlled by site staff If any animal is thought to be a particular problem it is removed from public access.

Health & safety notes

These points (plus any others you think of) must be covered with your group before the start of each visit. There are no exceptions. Health and Safety is of paramount importance.

In general, our aim in terms of health and safety is never to expose children to situations that they cannot safely cope with. Try to be aware of potential dangers at all times. You will no doubt find your own ways to convey the following points – be firm but do not scare anyone too much.

Hands

All children must wash their hands **with soap** after contact with animals, visit to lambing shed, before lunch and before departure. Additionally it is very important that children keep their hands away from their faces until they have been washed. (Warn children not to chew or lean on fences where there is obviously muck).

Cuts and Grazes

These must be covered with plasters before starting the visit to prevent risk of infection.

Eating and Drinking

Only in designated areas. Do not eat anything that has fallen on the ground.

Moving Vehicles

Stress that this is a working farm and that there will be vehicles about. Instruct children and adults to be vigilant at all times.

Animals

Children should be told that they do not need to approach any animals on the farm unless they are comfortable with doing this. This should always be under supervision.

Noise

Ask children to keep noise levels down whilst around the farm. You can compare the barn at lambing time with a human hospital and the need for peace and quiet there. As well as benefiting the animals, it is important that adults can be alerted quickly if there has been an accident.

Danger Areas

Be particularly careful and instruct the children to do likewise around the following sites: [Pond, work yards]

Fire

Groups must be told what the procedure is in case of fire and where the meeting point is. [Car Parks)

Allergies

Ask children if they suffer from any allergies, e.g. dust from the grain store. Make sure the teacher or helper who is with you knows about any cases and has appropriate medication. Make a mental note yourself.

Pregnant Adults

Check to see if any of the adult helpers are pregnant. If so they should be told that there is a risk of miscarriage from entering the lambing shed and having contact with the animals. Advise them not to go in.

Finally, children (and adults!) should be made aware of the importance of:
Staying close to the leader of their group.
Listening and paying attention at all times.
Asking whenever they are unsure about anything.
